This Official Report of the Professional School Counseling Program (PSC) is being distributed in compliance with CACREP Standard I.AA.6. The PSC Program has fully implemented a Comprehensive Assessment Plan (CAP). The CAP details both the continuous systematic PSC Program Evaluation as well as the assessment of student learning outcome processes.

The continuous systematic program evaluation collects data from follow-up studies of PSC graduates, PSC employers and site supervisors. Also, results are collected from the Counselor Preparation Comprehensive Examination (CPCE), the Praxis and an Exit Interview with students completing their Internship. TracDat is utilized in monitoring measurable PSC program goals and objectives.

The assessment of student learning involves collecting data on each individual student and includes the learning demonstrated in each course, scores on the comprehensive examination and learning assessed in Internship where the knowledge/skills needed to become a successful school counselor are evaluated using the Internship Checklist.

In the Fall of 2011 on the CPCE, 11 of 11 students received a passing score and the PSC average score was above the national average in each category. In 2011-12 on the Praxis, 15 of 15 students passed with scores at or above that required by North Carolina (570).

Based on the outcome of the systematic PSC program evaluations, the following program modifications have been made:

- Added Classroom Management to HPC 6452 Seminar in Professional School Counseling
- Added Crisis Prevention and Intervention to HPC 5754 Legal and Ethical Issues in Professional School Counseling
- Added studying DSM classifications to HPC 6290 Child and Adolescent Therapy

How does your evaluation of our graduates compare with your evaluation of employees who graduated from other universities?

Response #1: I have not supervised anyone else from any other universities. I have been very impressed with the HPC students and their willingness to jump right in!

Response #2: N/A-I have only supervised ASU graduates.

Response #3: I must say the enthusiasm for helping young people was much higher. The graduate I worked with from your institution was energetic, dedicated, knowledgeable and competent.

Response #4: I have one practicum student from ASU, two counseling interns from ASU, and one counseling intern from Lenoir-Rhyne. I felt that all of them were well trained in ethical conduct, individual and group skills.

Response #5: I will only take ASU HPC graduate students.

Response #6: Most of the counselors have graduated from your program.

Response #7: Only worked with Appalachian students.

Response #8: She was above average.

Response #9: Your student was eager to learn tools and strategies for counseling children individually.

Response #10: Better than average. Seems there is more attention and screening to gauge student's readiness for internships than other programs I have worked with.

Response #11: I cannot compare this graduate with graduates from other universities. I have not supervised any others. I have worked with recent graduates of ASU and Lenoir-Rhyne and observe all of them to be well-trained.

Response #12: N/A-This is my first mentee, so unable to compare.

Is there any growth/room for improvement in our graduates that could be addressed in our courses?

Response #1: None that I can think of at this time.

Response #2: For school counseling-classroom management. Also, I believe they could benefit from more individual counseling theory and more practice utilizing different individual counseling techniques, especially brief counseling which is useful in schools.

Response #3: None that I am aware of at this time.

Response #4: I think that elementary school counseling students need a little more exposure to working with classroom guidance materials prior to their internship. They also need more training in classroom management because in more elementary schools, classroom lessons are 40-50% of the counselor's schedule.

Response #5: They have little understanding of the inner workings of a school system. They are unaware of IEPs, 504, FBAs, etc. Their counseling skills are also a little behind. I believe internship should be a place to sharpen up, but I often feel like I'm starting from scratch. My current intern, however, is an exception. I've actually learned from her!

Response #6: Since teaching certification/experience is not required for your program, addressing classroom behavior management is helpful.

Response #7: In working with school age children, they would benefit from learning more about Individualized Education Plans, 504 plans, homebound services, and state testing. Counselors that are not responsible for testing still need to be able to interpret results for parents and teachers. Also, in working with children it is helpful to understand results of IQs and educational testing.

Response #8: I think you are on track.

Response #9: No answer

Response #10: Consideration for working in an agency, i.e. emphasize that communication is very important not only with client and family but also other professionals (teachers, foster parents, case managers, etc.)

Response #11: It could be helpful to address the counselor's role in RTI.

Response # 12: No answer

Response #1: I have thoroughly enjoyed working with all of the HPC students I have supervised.

Response #2: Please update your records. This form was addressed to the former counselor. She is no longer employed here. I have been the counselor here for 3 years and I have supervised 2 of your students.

Response #3: Great program!

Response #4: Working with your graduate and institution/program was a very pleasant experience and I would be glad to do so again in the future.

Response #5: I have found the ASU students I have worked with to be very knowledgeable about all areas of counseling. They bring new ideas to my work setting and accept feedback in a positive way. I appreciate the opportunity to work with ASU students and look forward to working with others in the future.

Response #6: The last 3 or 4 counseling interns have been exceptional! Thank you!

Response #8: I would prefer to have a student more than 1 time a week.

Response #9: Thank you for allowing our school to work with your intern. Our students benefit from this!

Response #11: Since the student with whom I worked had earned a degree in Family Therapy from ASU previously and came to the schools with mental health experience, I would not be able to fairly address her training specifically in school counseling. However, I can say that the Caldwell County School System is more rich to have her here with her well developed skills and diverse background.
